# QUESTIONS CONCERNING BIRPI AS A WHOLE

### FINANCIAL QUESTIONS

Sharing of common expenditure.- The sharing of common expenditure for the year 1964 was carried out along the same lines as in previous years (see Management Report 1963, page 8).

<u>Financial Rules.</u> In accordance with Articles 5 and 10 of the Financial Regulations, promulgated in 1963 by the Swiss Government in its capacity of supervisory authority (see Management Report 1963, page 8), and on the basis of the opinion expressed by the second ordinary session of the Interunion Coordination Committee, the Director of BIRPI promulgated the Financial Rules (Document BIG/64), with effect from November 1, 1964.

<u>Budget for 1965.</u> At its second session in September/October 1964, the Interunion Coordination Committee examined the budget proposals put forward by the Director of BIRPI for 1965 and approved them. The budget for 1965 was adopted by the Swiss Government, as supervisory authority, in conformity with the above proposals and opinion.

### INTERUNION COORDINATION COMMITTEE

The second ordinary session of the Committee was held at Geneva, from September 28 to October 2, 1964. All the States Members of the International Union for the Protection of Industrial Property (Paris Union) or of the International Union for the Protection of Literary and Artistic Works (Berne Union), which were not already members of the Committee, had been invited to be represented by observers. The Committee examined questions of common interest to both Unions, such as, the new Financial Rules, staff matters, the programme and budget of BIRPI for 1965.

Now that the Permanent Bureau of the Consultative Committee of the Paris Union has been replaced by the Executive Committee of the Conference of Representatives of the Paris Union, the Interunion Coordination Committee will henceforth consist of the Member States of the Executive Committee (and not the Permanent Bureau) of the Paris Union and of the Permanent Committee of the Berne Union.

### WORKING PARTY ON AN ADMINISTRATIVE CONVENTION

In pursuance of a decision taken by the Permanent Bureau (Paris Union) and the Permanent Committee (Berne Union) at their joint session held in October 1962, the Working Party appointed to revise some of the administrative clauses of the existing Conventions and other Agreements administered by BIRPI and to draw up an "administrative convention" met at the Headquarters of BIRPI from May 20 to 26, 1964. The Working Party drew up a draft instrument entitled "Draft Convention of the World Intellectual Property Organization".

RESULTS OF THE YEAR 1964

Receipts for 1964 exceeded expenditure by 349,631 Swiss francs(1):

Receipts ..... 3,942,511 francs Expenditure ..... 3,592,880 francs Difference ..... 349,631 francs

Of this difference, 189,000 francs were distributed to the Members of the Madrid Union and 160,631 francs were transferred to various reserve funds.

## RECEIPTS FOR THE YEAR 1964

Receipts for 1964 amounted to 3,942,511 francs<sup>(2)</sup>. In 1963, this amount had been practically the same (3,939,235 francs). These receipts are derived from two main sources and two subsidiary sources.

The two main sources are: (a) the contributions of the Member States of the Paris, Nice and Berne Unions; and (b) the fees collected by the two international registration services - the Trademarks Service (Madrid Union) and the Designs Service (The Hague Union).

In this part of the Report, all the amounts have been rounded off to francs. Unless otherwise stated, "francs" means Swiss francs.

The ceilings of the contributions remained, for all three Unions, the same as in 1963, i.e., 900,000 francs for the Paris Union, 71,428 francs for the Nice Union, and 400,000 francs for the Berne Union.

As compared with 1963, the amounts actually due were approximately 1% less, in the case of the Paris Union, and 3% more, in the case of the Berne Union. The reason for the decrease in the Paris Union is that, of the ten new Member States of this Union (all of which are in Class VI), eight - Central African Republic, Chad, Congo (Brazzaville), Ivory Coast, Madagascar, Senegal, Tanzania, Upper Volta - contribute on the basis of the older 1958 ceiling. The reason for the increase in the Berne Union is that, as from 1964, five States - Belgium, Pakistan, Rumania, Tunisia and Turkey - have joined the number of those which have agreed to pay their contributions on the basis of the 1962 ceiling, and that Upper Volta, contributing since 1964, has done likewise.

It should be noted that the contributions actually due for 1964 (Paris Union: 843,790 francs; Berne Union: 378,508 francs) are still 6% and 8%, respectively, below the theoretical ceilings (Paris Union: 900,000; Berne Union: 400,000 francs). The reason for this is that some States have not yet accepted these ceilings and pay their contributions on the basis of the older ceilings. These States are: for the Paris Union (apart from the eight already mentioned), Bulgaria, Canada, Ceylon, Czechoslovakia, Dominican Republic, Greece, Hungary, Israel, Rumania, South Africa, Turkey, United Arab Republic; for the Berne Union, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Greece, Poland, Portugal, Yugoslavia. Some of these States have in the meantime agreed to contribute on the basis of the new

The increase in the receipts of the <u>Trademarks</u> <u>Service</u> is approximately 3.5% and is mainly due to the fact that the number of registrations increased by about 2% as compared with the previous year.

The receipts of the <u>Designs Service</u> decreased by approximately 5% (the number of deposits registered having decreased by about 2% and that of prolongations by about 11%). The deficit of the Hague Union for 1964 amounts to 22,441 francs (as compared with 20,644 francs in 1963).

The two subsidiary sources of receipts are the subscriptions to periodicals and miscellaneous receipts.

The increase in the receipts of the Paris Union, Madrid Union, The Hague Union and Berne Union is due to the growth in the number of subscribers, the rise in prices, and new publications.

The decrease in the receipts of the Nice Union in due to the fact that the high sales figure for the publication entitled "Classification internationale des produits et services auxquels s'appliquent les marques de fabrique ou de commerce" was reached in 1963, the year the volume first appeared.

Miscellaneous receipts amounted to 114,346 francs (of which 68,451 francs are bank interest). In 1963, miscellaneous receipts totalled 109,941 francs.

The sum of 58,460 francs has been set aside for the improvement of the BIRPI Conference Room. This sum was obtained from renting one of the floors of the Headquarters Building of BIRPI.

### EXPENDITURE FOR THE YEAR 1964

Expenditure in 1964 amounted to 3,592,880 francs, as compared with 3,279,319 francs in 1963. This represents an increase of approximately 10%.

Although the number of permanent staff increased by only 3% (63 instead of 61), staff expenditure increased by 17%. The main reasons are the rise in certain salaries (there were two increases of 4.6% each for staff in category G, as a result of the rise in the cost of living), the increase in the social benefits payable by the employer, and the more frequent recourse to temporary help (when the work accumulates, for example, in connection with the preparations for conferences).

The increase of 137,000 francs for the item "Missions and Conferences" is due to the fact that, under the programme approved by the Committees, a greater number of meetings was organized by BIRPI.

The increase of approximately 8% for the item "Printing" is due to the rise in printing costs and to the increase in the number of trademarks registered.

At the end of 1963, the sum of 707,708 francs was still due by the Paris, The Hague and Berne Unions for the construction costs of the Headquarters Building of BIRPI, the Madrid Union having fully paid up its share in these costs. During 1964, the three Unions effected the amortization provided for in their financement plan (Paris Union: 17,338 francs; The Hague Union: 10,725 francs; Berne Union: 9,287 francs). They now owe the BIRPI Pension Fund (which had advanced the money) the following sums, respectively:

### PENSION FUND

At the end of 1964, the assets of the Pension Fund amounted to 4,299,107.32 francs.

As the Pension Fund is an independent BIRPI foundation, its situation is only mentioned in this Report for the record.

### FINANCIAL SITUATION OF THE FIVE UNIONS

Having regard both to income and expenditure for the financial year 1964, the position of the various Unions on January 1, 1965, was as follows:

The Paris Union and the Berne Union have no debts apart from their long-term debt towards the Pension Fund for the building costs of BIRPI Headquarters. They have very modest reserve accounts (337,247 and 26,365 francs, respectively). It should be noted that these results are obtained by considering as receipts the Member States' contributions for 1964 (as well as the arrears). In actual fact, most of these contributions are still owing, because, under the Paris Union and Berne Union system, Member States usually pay their contributions <u>after</u> the accounts for the financial year have been closed. The time lag of at least a year on average is offset by the advances received from the Swiss Government.

The same general considerations regarding the contributions of Member States also apply to the <u>Nice</u> <u>Union</u>. The latter closes the financial year with a modest reserve of 5,900 francs after paying off its debt of 24,988 francs.

The Madrid Union has no debts. After distributing 189,000 francs to its Member States out of the 1964 account, this Union is left with a reserve fund of 1,419,976 francs.

The Hague Union closes the financial year 1964 with a deficit of 22,441 francs. This sum, together with the previous year's deficit of 20,644 francs, brings the Hague Union's accumulated deficit to 43,085 francs, covered for the time being by advances from the Swiss Government. The Hague Union has no reserve fund. As indicated above, it still owes 193,200 francs for its share in the construction costs of the Headquarters Building.

### PERIODICAL REVIEWS:

"LA PROPRIETE INDUSTRIELLE" AND "INDUSTRIAL PROPERTY"

Twelve monthly issues of <u>La Propriété industrielle</u> and <u>Industrial Property</u> were published in 1964, with identical contents. The total number of pages was 288 in the French version and 280 in the English version.

Apart from the communications concerning the deposit of instruments of ratification and accession in respect of the Paris Convention and the separate Agreements, the following material was published, inter alia:

- under the heading "Legislation", laws from three Member States of the Union (Ireland, Italy, South Africa);
- general studies in the form of "Letters" concerning Argentina, Belgium, France, Hungary, Switzerland and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland;

- under the heading "Conventions and Treaties", the text of the Convention on the Unification of Certain Points of Substantive Law on Patents for Invention, signed under the auspices of the Council of Europe in Strasbourg on November 27, 1963;
- under the heading "Congresses and Meetings", reports on the Congress of the International League against Unfair Competition (Stresa, May 1963), the IVth Meeting of the Committee of Experts on the International Protection of Type Faces (Geneva, October 1963) and the First General Assembly of the Inter-American Association of Industrial Property (ASIPI) (Acapulco and Mexico City, April 1964);
- under the heading "Statistics", data from Member States of the Paris Union concerning the number of patents applied for and granted, the number of designs deposited and registered, and the number of trademarks filed and registered in 1963; for the first time, these statistics differentiate between applications, deposits, grants and registrations effected and issued in each country in respect of nationals of the country and foreigners;
- under the heading "International Union", a report on the mission of a BIRPI delegation to the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics and the text of the working agreement between BIRPI and the United Nations, signed on September 28 and October 2, 1964.

Conference of Representatives of the Paris Union.-The first session of this Conference was held at Geneva, from September 30 to October 2, 1964. All States Members of the Paris Union had been invited to attend. The Conference took formal note of the fact that, as a result of its own establishment, the Consultative Committee of the Paris Union (set up by a Resolution adopted at the Lisbon Conference in 1958) had ceased to exist. The Conference adopted its Rules of Procedure, elected the members of its Executive Committee, and examined the programme and budget of BIRPI on account of the Paris Union for the three-year period from 1965 to 1967.

<u>Study Group on Inventors' Certificates.</u> At the instance of the Director of BIRPI, a Study Group to examine the question of inventors' certificates in relation to the Paris Convention met at the headquarters of BIRPI, from January 27 to 30, 1964. The Study Group was composed of experts appointed by the Governments of ten Member States of the Paris Union and observers from the Soviet Union.

<u>Congress of Bogotá on Industrial Property for Latin</u> <u>America.</u> This Congress, convened and organized by the Government of the Republic of Colombia, under the auspices of BIRPI, was held from July 6 to 11, 1964. It discussed industrial property questions of special interest to Latin-American countries, both at the level of their national legislation and at the level of the Paris Convention. Delegates of nineteen Latin-American countries participated in the Congress and observers included representatives of six Member States of the Paris Union outside Latin America, the United Nations, and six other international organizations,

International Committee of Novelty-Examining Patent Offices.- The first session of this Committee was held at the headquarters of BIRPI on October 5 and 6, 1964. Nineteen States Members of the Paris Union were represented; observers from four non-member States and five international organizations also attended. The following topics were discussed: abandonment of inventions to the public by an international publication of patent applications where the grant of a patent is no longer required; industrial property statistics; certain questions in regard to patent office practice; index of corresponding patent applications and corresponding patents.

Committee of Experts to Study a Draft Model Law on Patents .- The Committee of Experts to Study Industrial Property Problems of Industrially Less Developed Countries, which met at Geneva in October 1963, had recommended that BIRPI should undertake to prepare a draft model law for the protection of inventions and technical improvements (see Industrial Property, 1963, page 234). A draft model law and a commentary were accordingly prepared by BIRPI and submitted to a Committee of Experts which met in Geneva. at the invitation of BIRPI, from October 19 to 23, 1964. Representatives of twenty-two developing countries attended the meeting, together with observers from the United Nations and other intergovernmental and non-governmental international organizations. The Committee examined the draft model law, article by article, and expressed its views on possible improvements in both the draft model law and the commentary. The revised texts will be available in 1965.

### OTHER ACTIVITIES OF BIRPI

### United Nations

During 1964, BIRPI continued its collaboration with the United Nations Secretariat in the field of industrial property. Towards the end of 1963, the Secretary-General of the United Nations had published his Report on the "Role of Patents in the Transfer of Technology to Developing Countries", with the preparation of which BIRPI had been closely associated.

In 1964, this Report was laid before various United Nations bodies and conferences before reaching its Litimate goal in the General Assembly.

The Report was examined in New York by the Third Preparatory Commission for the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD) and subsequently by UNCTAD itself at its meeting in Geneva, from March 23 to June 16, 1964. At both these meetings, BIRPI was represented by observers. At the latter, BIRPI prepared and had circulated, as a conference document, a note on the "Role of Patents in the Transfer of Technology to Developing Countries", and the Third Committee, on whose agenda this item appeared, was addressed by the Director of BIRPI. The Conference subsequently adopted without opposition a recommendation advocating, <u>inter alia</u>, that "competent international bodies, including United Nations bodies and the Bureau of the International Union for the Protection of Industrial Property, should explore possibilities for adaptation of legislation concerning the transfer of industrial technology to developing countries....".

BIRPI was also invited to be represented by observers at the 37th Session of the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations in Geneva in July 1964, when the United Nations Report on Patents was again considered. The representatives of BIRPI addressed the Economic Committee. The Council adopted a Resolution inviting the Secretary-General of the United Nations to make arrangements for the reciprocal exchange of information and documentation, and provision for reciprocal representation at meetings, between the competent international bodies, including United Nations bodies and the Bureau of the International Union for the Protection of Industrial Property.

This Resolution was one of the factors which led to the conclusion of a working agreement between BIRPI and the United Nations. The formal terms of this agreement are contained in an exchange of letters (dated September 28 and October 2, 1964) between the two Secretariats. The agreement provides, among other things, for mutual representation, in the capacity of observer, at meetings dealing with industrial property matters.

# Meetings of other Organizations

Among the meetings at which BIRPI was represented in 1964 were the following:

Council of Europe (Committee of Experts on Patents, May 4 to 8, and December 8 to 11); Committee for International Cooperation in Information Retrieval among Examining Patent Offices (ICIREPAT, October 8 to 15); Inter-American Association of Industrial Property (Constitutive Assembly); International Association for the Protection of Industrial Property (Executive Committee, September 3 to 18); International Chamber of Commerce (Industrial Property Commission, March 20 and September 10 and 11; International Federation of Patent Agents (Congress, October 9).

# BIRPI Training Programme

With the help and cooperation of various national industrial property offices, BIRPI granted during 1964, under its technical assistance programme, training fellowships to eight Government officials of developing countries who are working or expect to work in the industrial property offices of their own countries.

# BIRPI Mission to the Soviet Union

In response to an invitation from the USSR State Committee for Inventions and Discoveries, the Director and one of the Deputy Directors visited Moscow, from June 1 to 3, 1964.

### Manual of Conventions

During 1964, BIRPI published the "Manual of Industrial Property Conventions" in three languages: English, French and Spanish. Each edition contains the several texts of the Paris Convention and of the Separate Agreements. Following each text are lists indicating the countries bound by the text and the dates on which they ratified or acceded to it. These Manuals are loose-leaf volumes which will be kept up to date and may be ordered from BIRPI.

# RATIFICATIONS AND OTHER DIPLOMATIC NOTIFICATIONS . CONCERNING THE UNION

### Dice Text of 1957.

During 1964. Luxembourg and the Federal Republic of Germany (including Land Berlin) ratified the Nice Text of 1957 (see Industrial Property, 1964, pages 187 and 254).

Also in 1964, the Swiss Government communicated to Member States a declaration sent to it through the intermediary of the Embassy of the Czechoslovak Socialist . Republic to the effect that "the Council of State of the German Democratic Republic /had7 exa minedand approved .... the Madrid Agreement .... of April 14, 1891, revised ..... at Nice on June 15, 1957....." (see <u>Industrial Property</u>, 1964, page 254).

According to the terms of Article 12 (2) of the Nice Text, twelve ratifications or accessions at least are required for it to come into force.

At the end of 1963, there were ten ratifications or accessions.

The conditions of Article 12 (2) above having been fulfilled on December 15, 1964, the Nice Text will come into force on December 15, 1966 (see <u>Industrial Property</u>, 1964, page 254).

Seven States availed themselves of the right of territorial limitation provided for in Article 3 <u>bis</u> of the Agreement: Belgium, Czechoslovakia, Luxembourg, Monaco, Netherlands, Portugal and Spain. In addition, one State - Spain - took advantage of the possibility of denouncing the previous texts, as provided in Article 12 (4) of the Nice Text. However, this denunciation will not be effective until the Nice Text comes into force (December 15, 1966).

## PERIODICAL REVIEW: "LES MARQUES INTERNATIONALES"

In the course of 1964, BIRPI published in its review <u>"Les Marques Internationales"</u> the registration of 14,423 marks. It also published the operations notified during the year which affect the status in the Contracting States of international trademarks in force. The twelve monthly issues totalled 2,710 printed pages, without counting the annual index. The number printed was 2,815 copies per month, distributed as follows:



#### ADMINISTRATION

Trademarks registered in 1964 numbered 14,423 (14,193 in 1963; see Table No. I above).

Out of these 14,423 trademarks, 2,342 were only registered for a period of protection of 10 years, the applicants having made use of the possibility provided in Article 8 of the Agreement which enables them to pay only part of the international fee.

Out of the 1,393 trademarks registered in 1954, for which the fee paid at the time of filing covered only a period of protection of 10 years, the supplementary payment to cover maintenance of the registration for the full period of 20 years was made in the case of 953 marks.

Applications for registering one or more previous international registrations about to expire numbered 2,264 (i.e., 16% of the 14,423 registrations).

There were 33,301 notifications of total or partial refusals and of qualified acceptance (acceptance with a specified priority). There were 23,371 "sequels to refusals", i.e., notifications establishing confirmation, amendment or cancellation of the initial decision. Table No.II above indicates the country of origin and the number of these refusals.

In the course of 1964, BIRPI recorded 2,153 assignments (1,153 in 1963) and 4,172 "miscellaneous operations" (2,806 in 1963), the latter term being applied to limitations on the list of products for all contracting countries; changes in firms, domicile or address; corrections and all other changes which may affect the status of an international trademark for all contracting countries.

There were 80l cancellations of trademarks for the contracting countries of the Madrid Union as a whole. Of these cancellations, 417 took place as a result of renunciation, 3 following an assignment to persons not entitled to deposit international trademarks, 38l following failure to pay the supplementary fee for maintaining registration for 20 years, and 9 for other reasons. BIRPI also recorded the cancellation of 333 national registrations which had served as a basis for the same number of international registrations. These cancellations did not, however, entail cancellation of the corresponding international registrations (a note to that effect was published " in the Management Report of the year 1952, page 12). There were 3,455 total or partial renunciations of protection in one or more of the contracting countries - but not in all. Of these, 1,753 were "simultaneous renunciations" which were notified to BIRPI simultaneously with the application for international registration.

Total or partial invalidation decisions affected some 153 trademarks (137 in 1963). These decisions were of an administrative nature in the case of 139 trademarks and of a judicial nature for 14.

Searches for anticipation numbered 3,420 in respect of word marks and 98 in respect of figure marks. Searches concerning the ownership of trademarks numbered 57.

BIRPI issued 4,678 "extracts" (certificates of registration) referring to 5,115 trademarks.

In the course of 1964, the Trademarks Service of BIRPI received and despatched 90,745 letters, circulars, etc.

#### MEETING

A Committee of Experts for the international classification of industrial designs met in Geneva from October 12 to 16, 1964. This Committee, which was composed of experts designated by the Administrations of 13 countries (Austria, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, France, Italy, Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, United Kingdom and United States of America), undertook to prepare a draft international classification of industrial designs, in response to the Resolution adopted to that end by the Diplomatic Conference of The Hague on November 28, 1960. The draft, which includes 32 classes, divided into subclasses according to requirements, was submitted to all Member States of the Paris Union, which were invited to express their opinions on it (see Industrial Property, pages 255 to 261).

# LISBON UNION FOR THE PROTECTION OF APPELLATIONS OF ORIGIN AND THEIR INTERNATIONAL REGISTRATION

### ΝΟΤΕ

The Lisbon Agreement for the Protection of Appellations of Origin and their International Registration was signed by 12 States (Cuba, Czechoslovakia, France, Greece, Hungary, Israel, Italy, Morocco, Portugal, Rumania, Spain, Turkey) in 1958 and 1959.

Up to 1964, four States had ratified the Agreement: Czechoslovakia, Cuba, France, Israel (1). During 1964, there were no further ratifications.

Under the terms of the Agreement, it can only come into force after the deposit of the fifth instrument of ratification; the Agreement is not yet, therefore, in force.

the Republic of <u>Cyprus</u>: declaration of February 24, 1964 (see <u>Le Droit d'Auteur (Copyright)</u>, 1964, page 88).

These two new members brought the total membership of the Berne Union to 54 on December 31, 1964.

<u>Non-sovereign Territories.</u> During 1964, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland deposited a declaration to the effect that the Brussels Text (1948) of the Berne Convention was applicable to <u>Mauritius</u> as from December 27, 1964 (see Le Droit d'Auteur (Copyright), 1964, page 192).

<u>Change of Class.</u> In a Note dated October 7, 1964, the Government of <u>Japan</u> intimated that it intended to be placed, as from the financial year 1963, in Class III (instead of Class VI) with regard to its contribution towards the expenses of the International Bureau, pursuant to Article 23 (4) of the Berne Convention (see Le Droit d'Auteur (Copyright), 1964, page 192).

PERIODICAL REVIEW: "LE DROIT D'AUTEUR"

The twelve monthly issues of <u>Le Droit d'Auteur</u> contained 314 pages and the English insert, entitled <u>"Copyright"</u>, 196 pages.

Apart from the communications relating to the deposit of instruments of ratification and accession in respect of the Berne Convention, which, as it were, make up the official part of the review, the following material was published, inter alia:

- under the heading "Bilateral relations", exchanges of Notes or agreements between the following States: Austria-France; Belgium-France; Brazil-Italy; France-Israel; France-Italy; France-Lebanon; France-Madagascar; France-Norway; France-United Kingdom; Greece-Sweden; Italy-Norway; Spain-France;
- under the heading "National legislation", laws, decrees, orders or regulations from nine countries of the Union (Australia, France, Iceland, India, Ireland, New Zealand, Norway, Spain, United Kingdom) and from three non-Union countries (El Salvador, Mexico, Uganda);
- general studies on various legal questions and "Letters" concerning Denmark, France, Greece, Italy, Poland, United Kingdom and United States of America.

In pursuance of the Resolution adopted by the Permanent Committee of the Berne Union at its 11th session in New Delhi (India) in 1963 (see <u>Le Droit d'Auteur (Copyright)</u>, 1964, page 41), the Swiss Government consulted the Member States of the Union during 1964 with a view to authorizing BIRPI to publish a separate edition of the review in English.

As the results of this consultation were positive (see <u>Le Droit d'Auteur (Copyright)</u>, 1964, page 193), the review has been published, as from the January 1965 number, in two editions with identical contents: one in French ("Le Droit d'Auteur") and the other in English ("Copyright").

#### MEETINGS

#### Committee of African Experts to Study a Draft Model Copyright Law.

In pursuance of one of the Recommendations adopted by the African Study Meeting on Copyright, sponsored by BIRPI and Unesco from August 5 to 10, 1963, the Director of BIRPI convened, jointly with the Director-General of Unesco, a Committee of African Experts.

This Committee, which met at Geneva from November 30 to December 4, 1964, had been instructed to draw up, on the basis of the working documents prepared by the Secretariats of the sponsoring Organizations with the assistance of consultants, a draft African model copyright law. Experts from the following countries took part in the proceedings: Congo (Brazzaville), Ghana, Guinea, Ivory Coast, Liberia, Morocco and Nigeria.

At the close of the deliberations, the Committee adopted the text of a draft model law, together with a general report forming the commentary to the draft (see <u>Copyright</u>, 1965, pages 31 <u>et seq.</u>). #### QUESTIONS CONCERNING BIRPI AS A WHOLE

### SHARING OF COMMON EXPENDITURE

The sharing of common expenditure - i.e., expenses common to two or more of the Unions administered by BIRPI for the financial year 1965 was carried out along the same lines as in 1963 (see <u>Management Report</u> 1963, page 8) and 1964.

### INTERUNION COORDINATION COMMITTEE

The third ordinary session of the Committee was held at Geneva from September 28 to October 1, 1965. All the Member States of the International Union for the Protection of Industrial Property (Paris Union) and of the International Union for the Protection of Literary and Artistic Works (Berne Union), which were not already members of the Committee, had been invited to be represented by observers. The Committee examined questions of common interest to the Unions administered by BIRPI, such as, staff matters and the program and budget of BIRPI for 1966 (see document CCIU/III/12).

COMMITTEE OF GOVERNMENTAL EXPERTS ON THE ADMINISTRATIVE STRUCTURE OF INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION IN THE FIELD OF INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY

A Committee of Governmental Experts met at Geneva from March 22 to April 2, 1965, in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the Permanent Bureau of the Paris Union and the Permanent Committee of the Berne Union at their joint session in October 1962. Thirty-seven States were represented at the meeting. The Committee drew up a Draft Administrative Protocol to serve as a model for each Union and a Draft Convention providing for the establishment of the International Intellectual Property Organization (see Industrial Property, 1965, page 98). ## RESULTS OF THE YEAR 1965

# RECEIPTS FOR THE YEAR 1965

Receipts for 1965 amounted to 4,366,830 francs<sup>(2)</sup>. In 1964, they had amounted to 3,942,511 francs.

Except for the interest (which fell from 68,451 francs to 60,182 francs) and the contributions to be recovered from the Nice Union (which remained at 71,428 francs), all the sources of income showed an increase :

The ceilings of the contributions of the Paris and Nice Unions remained the same as in 1964, i.e., 900,000 francs for the Paris Union and 71,428 francs for the Nice Union. The ceiling of contributions of the Berne Union was raised, however, from 400,000 francs in 1964 to 700,000 francs in 1965.

In the case of the Paris Union, the amounts actually due were approximately 1% more than in 1964, owing in particular to the fact that Czechoslovakia and Rumania agreed to contribute on the basis of the ceiling of 900,000 francs (instead of 600,000 francs) and the Netherlands, which contributes on the basis of the ceiling of 900,000 francs, decided to change from Class IV to Class III. These facts, in addition to the contributions of five new Member States (Cameroon, Gabon, Malawi, Niger, and Trinidad and Tobago), were responsible for a reduction of approximately 4% in the amounts of the contributions of all the other member countries. It should be noted, however, that the total amount of contributions actually due for 1965 (852,674 francs) is 5% below the theoretical ceiling (900,000 francs),

 Including 20,000 francs, in accordance with Article 13(7) of the Paris Convention. because Bulgaria and Greece continue to contribute on the basis of the ceiling of 214,200 francs, which came into force in 1947, and, apart from thirteen countries in Class VI, the following countries still contribute on the basis of the ceiling of 600,000 francs, which came into force in 1959: Canada (Class II), Republic of South Africa, Turkey and the United Arab Republic (Class IV), Hungary and Israel (Class V).

In the case of the Nice Union, the total amount of contributions remained the same in,1965 as it had been in 1964, but each member country's contribution (except for that of the Netherlands) was reduced by approximately 2% as a result of the decision of the Netherlands to change from Class IV to Class III.

In the case of the Berne Union, the ceiling of 400,000 francs, in force between 1962 and 1964, was raised to 700,000 francs. In spite of the accession of two new countries (Cameroon and Cyprus), each country's share (except for that of Poland) was increased because of Poland's decision to change from Class III (15 units) to Class V (5 units). The amounts actually due (624,009 francs in all) are 11% below the theoretical ceiling (700,000 francs) because three countries continue to contribute on the basis of the ceiling of 231,400 francs, which came into force in 1957 (Bulgaria, Poland and Yugoslavia) and eleven countries still contribute on the basis of the ceiling of 400,000 francs, which came into force in 1962 (Austria, Belgium, Cameroon, Canada, Cyprus, Czechoslovakia, Dahomey, Hungary, Portugal, Rumania and Thailand).

The increase in the receipts of the Trademarks Service is approximately 4% (the number of registrations increased slightly as compared with the previous year).

The receipts of the Designs Service increased by approximately 10% (the number of deposits and extensions registered also showed a slight increase).

The deficit of the Hague Union for 1965 amounts to 24,471 francs (as compared with 22,441 francs in 1964).

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The two subsidiary sources of receipts are the subscriptions to periodicals and miscellaneous receipts.

The increase in the receipts of the Madrid Union is due mainly to the increase in this Union's share of the receipts from subscriptions to "La Propriété industrielle" and "Industrial Property" and to the rise in the number of subscribers to "Les Marques internationales". The increase in the receipts of the Berne Union is due mainly to the rise in the number of subscribers.

Miscellaneous receipts (sale of photocopies, registration fees for the Industrial Property Lecture Course, etc) amounted to 71,394 francs (45,896 francs in 1964). Receipts derived from bank interest amounted to 60,182 francs (68,451 francs in 1964).

The sum of 58,356 francs has been set aside for the improvement of the BIRPI Conference Room. This sum was obtained from renting one of the floors of the Headquarters Building of BIRPI.

#### EXPENDITURE FOR THE YEAR 1965

Expenditure in 1965 amounted to 4,106,488 francs, as compared with 3,592,880 francs in 1964. This represents an increase of approximately 14% as against a 10% increase in 1964 over expenses in 1963. The following comparisons may be made with the previous year's figures:

Although the number of permanent staff increased by only 3% (65 instead of 63), staff expenses increased by 12%. The main reasons were the rise in certain salaries (there were two increases of 4.6% each for staff in category G, and an increase in the post adjustment for P and higher categories, to take account of the rise in the cost of living), the increase in the social benefits payable by the employer, and more frequent recourse to supernumeraries (when the work accumulates, in connection with the preparation of conferences, for example).

The increase of approximately 9% for the item "Printing" is due mainly to the rise in printing costs and to the increase in the number of trademarks registered.

At the end of 1964, the Paris, Hague and Berne Unions still owed the sum of 670,400 francs towards the cost of the construction of the Headquarters Building of **BIRPI**, the Madrid Union having fully paid up its share.

During 1965, the three Unions effected the amortization provided for in their financement plans (Paris Union: 17,300 francs; The Hague Union: 10,700 francs; Berne Union: 9,200 francs), and they now owe the following sums to the BIRPI Pension Fund, which had advanced the money:

The increase in the item "Maintenance of Building", which amounts to 55,000 francs, is due mainly to the cost of important repairs to the water system and the moving of the archives of the Designs Service on the 2nd floor to the basement of the BIRPI Building.

#### FINANCIAL SITUATION OF THE FIVE UNIONS

Having regard both to income and expenditure for the financial year 1965, the situation of the various Unions on January 1, 1966, was as follows:

The Paris Union and the Berne Union have no debts apart from their long-term debt towards the Pension Fund for their share in the cost of the construction of the Building. They have very modest reserve funds (371,829 and 26,365 francs, respectively). It should be noted that these results are obtained by considering as receipts the contributions of the Member States for 1965 (as well as arrears). In actual fact, most of these contributions are still unpaid because, under the Paris and Berne Union system, Member States usually pay their contributions after the accounts for the financial year have been closed. The time lag of at least a year on average is offset by the advances received from the Swiss Government.

The same general considerations regarding the contributions of Member States also apply to the Nice Union, which has a very modest reserve fund of 12,942 francs.

The Madrid Union has no debts. After distributing 147,000 francs to its Member States out of the 1965 account, it is left with a reserve of 1,538,087 francs.

The Hague Union closes the financial year with a deficit of 24,472 francs. This sum, together with the deficit for the previous two years amounting to 43,085 francs, brings the Hague Union's accumulated deficit to a total of 67,557 francs, covered for the time being by advances from the Swiss Government. The Hague Union has no reserve fund. As indicated above, it still owes 182,500 francs for its share in the cost of the construction of the Headquarters Building.

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### PERIODICAL REVIEWS:

### "LA PROPRIETE INDUSTRIELLE" AND "INDUSTRIAL PROPERTY"

Twelve monthly issues of La Propriété industrielle and <u>Industrial Property</u> were published in 1965 with identical contents. The total number of pages was 300 in the French version and 290 in the English version.

Apart from the communications concerning the deposit of instruments of ratification and accession in respect of the Paris Convention and the separate Agreements, the following material was published, <u>inter alia</u>:

- under the heading "Legislation", laws from seven Member States of the Union (France, Italy, Netherlands, Norway, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, United States of America);

- general studies in the form of articles or "Letters" concerning Austria, France, Netherlands, United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, United States of America, Venezuela; other general studies dealt with the Scandinavian countries, the Socialist countries members of the Council for Mutual Economic Aid (COMECON), the Latin American countries and countries belonging to the European Economic Community (EEC);

- under the heading "Reports of International Organizations", notes or reports concerning the International Association for the Protection of Industrial Property, the International Chamber of Commerce, and the International Federation of Patent Agents;

- under the new heading "New Plant Varieties", the Danish Act to protect plant breeders' rights, of 1962, and two general studies on the Paris Convention for the Protection of New Varieties of Plants;

- under the heading "International Unions", notes or reports on the main BIRPI meetings held throughout 1965.

#### BIRPI MEETINGS

Executive Committee of the Conference of Representatives of the Paris Union .- The first session of the Executive Committee of the Conference of Representatives of the Paris Union was held at Geneva from September 29 to October 1, 1965. In the course of the session, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics was co-opted as member of the Executive Committee. This being its first session, the Committee established its own Rules of Procedure. It unanimously adopted a resolution requesting the Swiss Government as Supervisory Authority to urge all Member States of the Paris Union which were not yet contributing on the basis of the 900,000 Swiss francs ceiling, in force since the beginning of 1963, to do so. Finally, the Committee noted with approval the program and budget proposals of the Director of BIRPI for 1966. ...

<u>Committee of Experts on Inventors' Certificates.</u> This Committee, in which twenty-seven Member States of the Paris Union participated, met at Geneva from March 15 to 19, 1965, in order to examine the desirability of, and possible solutions for, amending the Paris Convention so that the text would contain express provisions on inventors' certificates. The Committee had before it a working paper prepared by BIRPI in collaboration with Experts appointed by the Swedish Government as host of the Diplomatic Conference scheduled for 1967. The Committee adopted a draft text for a new Section I in Article 4 of the Paris Convention, providing that, subject to certain conditions, applications for inventors' certificates would be treated in the same manner and have the same effects as applications for patents, for the purpose of the right of priority under Article 4 of the Convention.

<u>International Committee of Novelty-Examining Patent</u> <u>Offices. Advisory Group.-</u> At its meeting in October 1964, the International Committee of Novelty-Examining Patent Offices had decided to leave the further study of two questions - statistics and an index of corresponding patents to advisory groups.

A first advisory group met in Geneva on March 11 and 12, 1965. It examined the form and wording of the new statistical questionnaires on industrial property and discussed further steps in connection with the study of a world patent index. The new statistical questionnaires for 1964 were distributed in the course of 1965.

A second advisory group met in Geneva on December 9 and 10, 1965. It examined the report prepared by BIRPI on the feasibility of establishing a world patent index service and approved the text of a brochure describing the proposed service. The brochure would also serve as a survey of the demand for such a service. It would be a joint publication by BIRPI and the International Patent Institute.

### OTHER ACTIVITIES OF BIRPI

#### United Nations

During 1965, BIRPI continued and extended its cooperation with the United Nations and its subsidiary bodies in accordance with the working agreement established between BIRPI and the United Nations in 1964.

The majority of the United Nations meetings at which BIRPI was represented by observers expressly endorsed BIRPI's role in the industrial property field. In particular, the Board of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development nominated BIRPI as one of the intergovernmental organizations to be permanently associated with the work of the Board; the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) adopted a resolution requesting the Secretary-General, in cooperation with competent international bodies including BIRPI, to explore the question of the transfer of technology to developing countries; and the Asian Conference on Industrialization adopted a recommendation recognizing the work now being done in the industrial property field by United Nations bodies and BIRPI.

#### Meetings of Other Organizations

Among the meetings dealing with industrial property at which BIRPI was represented in 1965 were the following:

Council of Europe (Committee of Experts on Patents); International Olive Oil Council (Congress); Inter-American Association for the Protection of Industrial Property (ASIPI, Buenos Aires); International League Against Unfair Competition (Congress).

#### BIRPI Training Program

During 1965, BIRPI continued its technical assistance program, with the help of various national industrial property offices, by granting fellowships for the training of six Government officials of developing countries who are working or who expect to work in the industrial property offices of their countries. These training periods average from two to three months.

### BIRPI Missions to South America and Asia

The Director of BIRPI made official visits to the competent Government authorities of Argentina, Chile and Uruguay. One of the Deputy Directors made a similar visit to Venezuela.

The Director of BIRPI also visited the Government authorities of Algeria, India, Iran, Iraq, Pakistan, and - together with one of the Deputy Directors - the Soviet Union.

### Industrial Property Lecture Course

For the first time in its history, BIRPI organized an Industrial Property Lecture Course in Geneva, from September 20 to 24, 1965. Some three hundred participants from twenty-seven countries attended. The Course was held mainly for the benefit of Government officials and private practitioners whose professional activities bring them into contact with questions concerning the law of industrial property.

#### Publications

BIRPI published its Model Law for Developing Countries on Inventions in three languages (English, French and Spanish) in 1965. The publication contains the text of the Model Law together with an extensive commentary, and there is a separate edition for each language.

A Supplement to the Manual of Industrial Property Conventions was published in English and French.

#### MEETING

The <u>Ad hoc Conference of Directors of National</u> <u>Industrial Property Offices</u> of Member States of the Madrid Union met in Geneva from December 13 to 17, 1965. The Conference adopted draft transitional Regulations concerning the International Registration of Trademarks and examined certain questions relating to the interpretation of the Nice Text (see Industrial Property, 1966, page 23).

## PERIODICAL REVIEW: "LES MARQUES INTERNATIONALES"

Throughout 1965, BIRPI published in its review entitled <u>"Les Marques internationales"</u> the registration of 14,596 marks. It also published the operations notified during the year which affect the status in the Contracting States of international trademarks in force. #### ADMINISTRATION

Trademarks registered in 1965 numbered 14,596 (14,423 in 1964; see Table No. I above).

Out of these 14,596 trademarks, 2,267 were registered only for a period of protection of 10 years, the applicants having availed themselves of the possibility provided in Article 8 of the Agreement which enables them to pay part only of the international fee.

Out of the 1,397 trademarks registered in 1965, for which the fee paid at the time of filing only covered a period of protection of 10 years, the supplementary payment to cover maintenance of the registration for the full period of 20 years was made in the case of 975 marks.

Applications for registering one or more previous international registrations about to expire numbered 1,944 (i.e., 13 % of the 14,596 registrations).

There were 32,912 notifications of total or partial refusal and of qualified acceptance (acceptance with a limited priority). There were 21,419 "sequels to refusals", i.e., notifications establishing confirmation, amendment or cancellation of the initial decision. Table No. II above indicates the country of origin and the number of these refusals.

In the course of 1965, BIRPI recorded 2,308 assignments (2,153 in 1964) and 3,190 "miscellaneous operations", the latter term being applied to limitations on the list of goods for all contracting countries; changes in firms, domicile or address; corrections and all other changes which may affect the status of an international trademark for all contracting countries.

There were 729 cancellations of international trademarks for the contracting countries of the Madrid Union as a whole. Of these cancellations, 400 took place as a result of renunciation, 3 following an assignment to persons not entitled to deposit international trademarks, 294 following failure to pay the supplementary fee for maintaining registration for 20 years, and 32 for other reasons. BIRPI also recorded the cancellation of 330 national registrations which had served as a basis for the same number of international registrations. These cancellations did not, however, entail cancellation of the corresponding international registrations (a note to that effect was published in the <u>Management Report</u> for the year 1952, page 12).

There were 3,867 total or partial renunciations of protection in one or more of the contracting countries - but not in all. Of these 2,206 were "simultaneous renunciations" which were notified to BIRPI simultaneously with the application for international registration.

Total or partial invalidation decisions affected 115 trademarks. These decisions were of an administrative nature in the case of 102 trademarks and of a judicial nature for 13.

Searches for anticipation numbered 3,648 in respect of word marks and 115 in respect of figure marks. Searches concerning the ownership of trademarks numbered 60.

BIRPI issued 5,377 "extracts" (certificates of registration) referring to 5,592 trademarks.

In the course of 1965, the Trademarks Service of BIRPI received and despatched 93,855 letters, circulars, etc.

<u>Non-sovereign Territories.</u> In 1965, New Zealand deposited a declaration to the effect that the Rome Text (1928) of the Berne Convention was applicable to the Cook and Tokelau Islands as from March 18, 1965 (see <u>Copyright</u>, 1965, page 55).

<u>Change of Class.</u> The Polish Government intimated that it intended to be placed, as from the financial year 1965, in Class V (instead of Class III) with regard to its contribution towards the expenses of the International Bureau, pursuant to Article 23(4) of the Berne Convention (see <u>Copyright</u>, 1965, page 8). PERIODICAL REVIEWS: "LE DROIT D'AUTEUR" AND "COPYRIGHT"

In pursuance of the Resolution adopted by the Permanent Committee of the Berne Union at its llth session in New Delhi (India) in 1963 (see Le Droit d'Auteur (Copyright), 1964, page 41), the Swiss Government consulted the Member States of the Union during 1964 with a view to authorizing BIRPI to publish a separate edition of the review in English.

As the results of this consultation were positive (see <u>Le Droit d'Auteur (Copyright)</u>, 1964, page 193), the review has been published, as from the January 1965 number, in two editions with identical contents: one in French ("Le Droit d'Auteur") and the other in English ("Copyright").

The twelve monthly issues of <u>Le Croit d'Auteur</u> contained 296 pages and the English edition, <u>Copyright, 287</u> pages.

Apart from the communications relating to the deposit of instruments of ratification and accession in respect of the Berne Convention, or declarations concerning its appli cation, the following material was published, <u>inter alia</u>:

- under the heading "International Conventions", the Protocol to the European Agreement on the Protection of Television Broadcasts; the European Agreement for the Prevention of Broadcasts transmitted from Stations outside National Territories;

- under the heading "National Legislation", laws, decrees, orders or regulations from seven countries of the Union (Denmark, Germany (Federal Republic), India, Japan, Morocco, Norway and the United Kingdom) and from three non-Union countries (Malawi, United States of America and Zambia);

- general studies on various legal questions and "Letters" concerning the following countries: Argentina, Czechoslovakia, France, Germany (Federal Republic), Hungary, Israel, Netherlands, Spain, Sweden and the United Kingdom;

- under the heading "International Activities", reports on meetings and congresses of certain non-governmental organizations.

#### BIRPI MEETINGS

Permanent-Committee of the Berne Union (12th session).-In accordance with its Rules of Procedure, the Permanent Committee held its 12th ordinary session in Paris, from November 15 to 18, 1965. Some of the many questions on its agenda were examined at meetings held jointly with the Intergovernmental Copyright Committee, in view of their common interest. The final report and the various resolutions were published in Copyright, 1966, pages 9 et seq.

Committee of Governmental Experts preparatory to the Stockholm Conference for the Revision of the Berne Convention .- In pursuance of a resolution adopted by the Permanent Committee of the Berne Union at its 11th session in New Delhi in 1963, the Director of BIRPI invited the Member States of the Berne Union to participate in a Committee of Governmental Experts in order to express the views of their respective Governments on the proposals for the revision of the Berne Convention drafted by the Swedish/BIRPI Study Group. This Committee of Experts met in Geneva from July 5 to 14, 1965. The representatives of thirty-five Member States of the Berne Union were present, as well as a number of observers from interested international organizations. The details of the discussion and the opinions expressed by the Committee were reproduced in the report of the debates which was sent to Member States at the end of July, 1965 (see Copyright, 1965, pages 194 et <u>seq</u>.).

<u>Meeting of Government Representatives to Constitute</u> <u>the Intergovernmental Committee established by the Rome</u> <u>Convention of 1961.-</u> The International Convention for the Protection of Performers, Producers of Phonograms and Broadcasting Organizations, adopted at Rome in 1961, came into force on May 18, 1964. In accordance with Article 32, paragraph 3, of that Convention, an Intergovernmental Committee was to be constituted twelve months after the Convention came into force. A meeting of Government representatives of the Contracting States was therefore convened on May 18, 1965, at the International Labour Office in Geneva, by the three international Organizations concerned, ILO, Unesco and BIRPI. As a result of the elections held at that meeting the following States became members of the Intergovernmental Committee established by the Rome Convention: Congo (Brazzaville), Czechoslovakia, Ecuador, Mexico, Sweden and the United Kingdom. The report on the meeting was published in <u>Copyright</u>, 1965, on pages 171 to 173.

#### OTHER ACTIVITIES OF BIRPI

Meetings of Other Organizations. - Among the meetings at which BIRPI was represented in 1965 were the following: International Literary and Artistic Association (51st Congress, August 23 to 28); International Confederation of Societies of Authors and Composers (Legislative Committee, March 4 to 6, October 28 and 29); International Secretariat of Entertainment Unions (Founding Congress, March 8 to 11); International Publishers Association (17th Congress, May 30 to June 5).

Legal-technical Assistance.- With the cooperation of one of the national copyright offices, BIRPI granted a fellowship in 1965 to a national of a developing country. This marked the start of the training program in the field of copyright. BIRPI also gave assistance to a number of developing countries in the drafting of their national copyright laws.
